THE TEXT

When Hari Kieft was two, he was diagnosed with spastic paralysis after being born 10 weeks premature, leaving him confined to a wheelchair.

His devoted parents, Cerianne and Richard, feared he may never walk and play like other children. But after friends and family raised £ 45.000, he flew to St Louis Children's Hospital in Missouri, USA, for a life-changing surgery. There, the neurosurgeon Dr Tae Park and his team performed an operation to cut nerves in Hari's back to release the spasticity in his legs.

Now, just five weeks later, Hari is on his feet for the first time. Mrs. Kieft said: "It is a new beginning. We have almost got to the stage where we forget that Hari used to get around by crawling." Hari, who is three now, from South Wales, UK, has now been walking for 5 weeks, and will undergo physiotherapy aftercare. Mrs. Kieft said: "Hari's new skill is being able to stand and walk. We put that on Facebook and we had an e-mail from the physiotherapist, who was really thrilled with his progress because he has exceeded all expectations."

Although doctors were doubtful about the surgery, they said they are now convinced they made the right decision. Mrs. Kieft said: "Belief and faith got us to America. If we did not believe Hari would walk and if we had not kept faith in Dr Park, we would not have got there. This is not a cure. It is an opportunity for a child to have a better quality of life and independence."

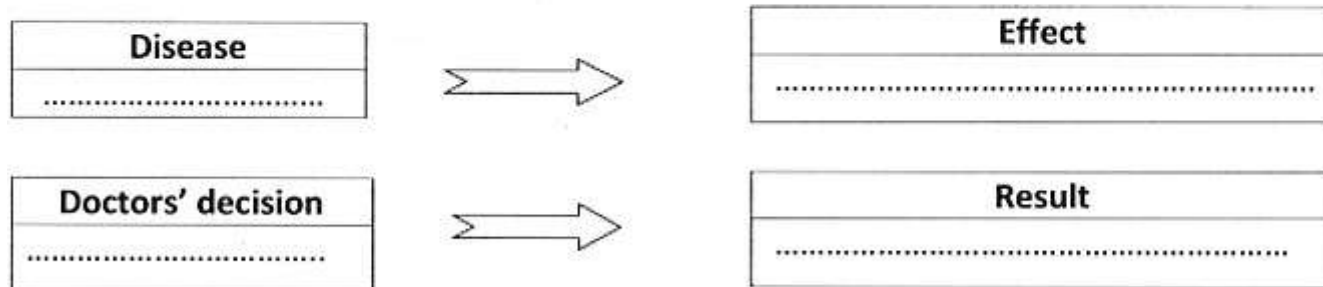
